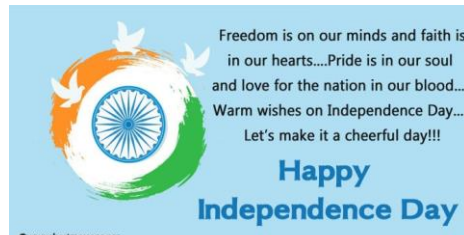
The highlight of this month shall be the National Integration Week where children will be exposed to a socio- cultural extravaganza which is the essence of our country.

EVENT	ACTIVITY	
Day 1	The land of languages	Our country is very diverse with many languages, showing the strength and unity of our land. The children will meet & greet in the language specified to them, giving them a glimpse into the vastness of languages spoken in India.
Day 2	Know your Leaders 	The great freedom fighters and leaders of India worked tirelessly to bring our country together. Few children from each team will play the role of such eminent personalities to highlight their contributions in uniting India.
Day 3	Cultural Gully	A visit to different states of our country through the dances performed by our children to let them know about the colourful culture of their motherland.
Day 4	Bonded Together	An activity will be done to make the children understand the significance of unity in diversity- How we all are different yet one. Material required- one old white handkerchief, poster colours (any 5 colours), dropper, mat & apron.
Day 5	Independence Day Assembly	The National Integration Week will culminate with a special assembly conducted by the students of Pre-Primary to celebrate the 75 th year of Independence.

20th August (Friday): RAKSHABANDHAN

This festival celebrates the love between a brother and sister. On this day, sisters tie Rakhi on the wrists of their brothers to protect them against evil influences and pray for their long life and happiness. The brothers in turn, give a gift- which is a promise that they will protect their sisters from any harm. The children will be told more about the significance of this day through a video & story.

27th August (Friday): JANMASHTAMI

‘JANMASHTAMI CELEBRATIONS’–The birth of Lord Krishna will be celebrated with full fanfare as the tiny tots will sit dressed as little ‘Krishna’ and ‘Radha’ enjoying and dancing to the songs played in the class. A small ‘matki’ will be painted and decorated to celebrate the mischievousness of little ‘Kanha’. The children are required to keep one small earthen pot, acrylic paint (any colour of their choice), paint brush, mat & apron for the activity that will be done during the home room period.
